ties. Since its beginnings at Galapagos in 1962, WWF has focused its work on unique areas, being one of the first organizations to provide the required support for the establishment of the Charles Darwin Research Station in Puerto Ayora, Galapagos.

WWF Galapagos Program works in four main areas:

- (1) Sustainable management: tourism, good practices and the tourism observatory
- (2) Environment management: solid waste management, renewable energies and environmental monitoring
 - (3) Fisheries
- (4) Protected Areas Management: zoning, management plan, and monitoring and surveillance

Further, WWF Galapagos Program also maintains a program of college scholarships for aspiring students of the Archipelago





(1) Eco-certification processes of mahi mahi (dorado) fishery under the Marine Stewardship Council standard to ensure its

sustainability; and, therefore access international markets in which depend tens of thousands of fishermen that operate along the Ecuadorian coastline.

(2) Promotion of rights-based management like the fisheries management scheme. This scheme helps to incorporate an element of responsibility on the actors through assigning well-defined and secure rights. It generates the required incentive that allows the user to be part of the planning processes and fishery management in the medium and long term.

In Ecuador we work with fisheries that use purse seines for catching tuna and trawls for catching titi shrimp

- (3) Restoration of forest ecosystems with the Forest Partner Program of the Ministry of Environment and Decentralized Autonomous Governments of the middle basin of Pastaza.
