Overview of the project

The Community-Based Forest Enterprises project aims at strengthening forest-based operations run by indigenous and rural communities in four locations within WWF priority ecoregions:

- Bolivia
- Cameroon
- Panama
- Papua New Guinea
- Funded by the European Commission, 3-year period
- Started officially on 01-01-2007; operations began in mid-2007

















Objectives and expected results

- General objectives:
 - Increase incomes and welfare
 - Strengthen forest management capacities
 - Generate models for CFEs to manage forests for increased income

Specific objective:

Improved capacity of CFEs to access and manage forests for income, employment and investments

















Objectives and expected results (Cont.)

Expected Results:

ER1: CFEs mange forest resources equitably and

transparently

ER2: Institutional frameworks increase ability of CFEs to

access & manage forest resources

ER3: Generate revenues, employment and investments

leading to poverty reduction

ER4: Tools and lessons learned adapted and

disseminated

ER5: Policy changes to support CFEs

ER6: Efficient and effective project management

















Main components

- Bolivia
 - Five main operations
 - 21 communities
- Cameroon
 - Two main operations
 - 22 communities
- Panama
 - Two main operations
 - Six communities
- PNG
 - Special case, roughly communities



















Key issues



- Initially, not enough emphasis on the concept of enterprise
- Forest management concepts and technical skills are learned fast; business and commercial skills learned slowly
- Constraining regulatory frameworks: Panama, Cameroon
- Some questions about sustainable forest management
- Illegal actions in all countries

















Accomplishments

- Startup affecting over 50 communities
- Forest management plans being applied and followed everywhere
- Legal structures of rights and obligations established for all communities
- Forest management, wood measurement and harvesting skills imparted in all field components
- Business skills training underway in all four countries
- Forest products sales occurring in all operations

















Accomplishments (Cont)

- Business plans and community development plans in all components
- Policy issues identified and policy dialogue underway in all countries
- Lessons of experience assembled and discussed in encounter in Bolivia
- Despite difficulties, the CBFE project approach is popular: requests for replication in all countries & international credibility because of business focus
- WWF seen as a credible organization in CFE field

















The moral of the story

- You don't fight poverty without creating wealth
- You don't create wealth without commerce
- You don't have commerce without enterprises
- Prosperous and independent enterprises require favorable institutions and knowledge of forest management & business
- Participation of communities in conservation depends on their view of the forest as an economic asset
