**Developing the Business Case for Palm Oil on Degraded Lands**Bali, INDONESIA
November 2008

During the sixth annual meeting of the Roundtable for Sustainable Palm Oil (RSPO RT6), WWF presented the preliminary findings of its study, 'Development and Improvement of Palm Oil on Degraded Lands.' The report is the initial product of a collaborative effort between WWF and Cargill involving intensive field research and interviews with oil palm companies. The study finds that palm oil on degraded lands can be profitable and there is a large potential to increase production through better management practices without additional capital investments. The research will continue in 2009 with the goal of working with plantations to put the findings into action.

WWF & Standard Chartered Bank BRUNEI Darussalam October 2008

Standard Chartered Bank (SCB) presented BND700,000 donation to WWF and Brunei's Heart of Borneo Council. The presentation was accepted by the Crown Princess of Brunei Darussalam. The funding was generated through the 'Greatest Race on Earth' partnership between WWF-UK and SCB. The funding will support priority work of the Heart of Borneo including projects in Brunei as well as catalyze transboundary initiatives with Malaysia and Indonesia.

Photovoices Project
West Kalimantan, INDONESIA
December 2008

WWF, Photovoices International and National Geographic accomplished seven months of collaborative project in six villages along Labian-Leboyan catchment area. This area links two Heart of Borneo national parks, Betung Kerihun and Danau Sentarum.

The project proved useful in building and strengthening community awareness toward nature, as well as to voice out their concerns and aspiration on the natural resource use from the communities' point-of-view. The project will be extended into other Heart of Borneo areas in Central Kalimantan.
