# Industry guidance to avoid illegal 'pirate' fish products in supply chains

9 February - WWF UK together with other NGOs launched a guide advicing UK industry, retailers and brands of the risks associated with importing and trading illegal fishery products.

#### UN climate talks require business unusual

5 February - WWF asked climate negotiators meeting in Geneva to adopt a 'business unusual' approach to deliver the draft of a new global climate deal.

#### Will Europe keep financing coal pollution overseas?

29 January - While EU Finance ministers are deciding on the EU's position on public support for coal, WWF asked to stop financing coal overseas to green the economy and stop climate change.

#### EU to ban fish imports from Sri Lanka for illegal fishing

26 January - WWF and other NGOs welcomed the EU's decision to 'red-card' Sri Lanka for failing to combat illegal fishing. Trade bans are already in place for Cambodia and Guinea.

#### India's tigers come roaring back according to new report

20 January - Thanks to better management and protection measures, tigers' population has increased from 1,411 in 2006 to 2,226 in 2014. Poaching remains the greatest threat to wild tigers.

#### Greece changes government and environmental policy

WWF-Greece and other NGOs strongly criticised Syriza's decision to abolish the Ministry for Environment and to merge it with Agriculture and Industry. They ask the government to reconsider the abolition and deliver the ecological transformation promised during the elections. Read more



#### Swedish ban on Wolf cull overturned

WWF criticised the decision by a Swedish court to lift the ban on wolf hunting and allowing the killing of a species listed as endangered by the EU Nature directive. 43 wolves - more than 10% of the population - might be killed. Read more
