3 March - The agency's report 'State of the Environment' warns the Commission to give greater importance to environment and shows that green policies can lead to innovation, jobs and growth.



#### EU's climate and energy vision comes with blind spots

25 February - WWF warns that the EU Energy vision and 'Paris Protocol' by the Commission are unclear on how to shift Europe to a low-carbon economy and seriously address climate change.

24 February - MEPs agreed to curb the amount of CO2 pollution permits in the market but postponed reforms to 2019.



#### Copa Cogeca should continue dialogue on large carnivores

19 February - WWF and other NGOs wrote to European farmers highlighting the need for different stakeholders to ensure large carnivores coexist with human activities.



#### Good progress in Geneva, but hard work still ahead

13 February - WWF points out the need for political decisions at national levels, such the CO2 emissions plans, to lead to an ambitious deal before Paris climate meeting.

#### **Knock out the Toxic Tonnes!**

On 24th February the Environment Committee of the European Parliament voted on the Market Stability Reserve, to address the problem of a gigantic surplus of pollution permits in the EU Emissions Trading Scheme (EU ETS).



CAN Europe, Carbon Market Watch and WWF hosted a Climate Boxing Ring in front of the European Parliament and invited MEPs to knock out the Toxic Tonnes of the EU ETS.

#### Romanian transport gets greener

Future road, navigation and rail transport projects in Romania will include nature conservation proposals by WWF. Romania has rich natural habitats with large carnivores and rare species, like sturgeons. Future projects will have to consider routes that avoid negative impact on all protected areas, including Natura 2000. Read more

#### Italy close to legal punishment for eco-crimes

The Italian Senate has voted in favour of a new law against eco-



crimes, <u>welcomed by WWF</u>. If approved, damages against nature like "environmental disaster", "pollution", or "illegal trade in radioactive materials" could be treated and punished as "crimes". <u>WWF has launched a petition signed by more than 50.000</u> to support stronger sanctions for crimes against wildlife.
