Summary of the application

What is the project about?

The Baltic Sea is still one of the most threatened seas in the world. Eutrophication or over-fertilization has been identified as the single most important threat to its health and agricultural runoff is the main cause. The 'Baltic Sea Farmer of the Year Award' is a competition intended to inspire farmers in the entire Baltic Sea region to take an active part in combating eutrophication. It was launched in 2009 by WWF in cooperation with the Baltic Farmers Forum for the Environment, and farmers' organisations from around the Baltic Sea. The purpose of the Award is to highlight best practices in "Baltic-friendly" farming and to recognise and promote farmers who are leading in innovative measures to reduce run-off from their farms

How was the project implemented?

The competition is held on a regional level based upon the results of national competitions held in each participating Baltic Sea coastal country. A prize sum of 1 000 euros is given to each national winner and a prize sum of \in 10 000 to the regional winner, selected by an international jury. To promote the project, press releases, articles, radio and TV programmes in local and national media are organised. Information is distributed in national and international news portals and the national and regional winners participate in international conferences.

National and regional winners of the 'Baltic Sea Farmer of the Year Award' are not only exemplary farmers, but they also are concerned for the future of the farming profession and its effect on nature in general. They are also full of innovative ideas and continually test different methods in their farming practice. Their activities show their dedicated commitment not only to run their own farms in an environmentally sustainable way, but also to spread their valuable experience amongst the general public and farming colleagues. Not only does this award scheme acknowledge their effort and hard work, it inspires other farmers to follow and learn from their experience.
